

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#### SYNOPSIS

Told through 35mm black and white photography, a sprawling narration, and contradictory subtitles, "Tales of the Marvelous and News of the Strange" explores the lives of a young couple as they grapple with their cultural and spiritual identities through superstition and art.

Ahmed (A.T. Ragheb), an Egyptian-American aspiring actor anxiously awaiting news of his latest film audition, gives in to his superstitions and sets off on a journey across Pittsburgh, trying to force the hands of fate. Lily (Grace Cooper), a photography student, meanwhile, criss-crosses the city unseen on a journey of her own, photographing and recalling scenes from her past. "Tales of the Marvelous and News of the Strange" is an adventure into the realms of both the physical and the spiritual: the urban landscapes of western Pennsylvania versus dreams of Egypt; the human psyche; the past; the present; the fantastic; and the anatomy of film itself.


#### DIRECTORS' STATEMENT

We find the characters of "Lily" and "Ahmed" attempting desperately to define themselves and, in the process of doing so, both lean heavily on the idea of place - "Lily" through her connections to the actual, physical spaces of her childhood and young adulthood in Pittsburgh and "Ahmed" through his imagined connections to Cairo. It is from "Ahmed's" confused sense of cultural identity that the film derives much of its structure. The storytelling techniques of embedded narratives - stories within stories - and multiple, parallel storylines are ubiquitous in Arab and Middle Eastern literature and are used heavily in the medieval Arabian story collection from which our film borrows its title. The sardonic nature of "Lily's" narration, also common of the omniscient narrators of Arabian tales, is mirrored in "Ahmed's" confused understanding of the culture with which he so hopelessly wishes to connect; evidenced most obviously by his interest in Ancient Egypt which, of course, contrasts sharply with the reality of modern day Egypt (shown in the stunning 35mm color photography of Osama Makawy), of which he knows very little and only reinforces his identity as an American – or at the very least *not* an Egyptian.  $\rightarrow$ 



#### DIRECTORS' STATEMENT (cont.)

"Tales" is a fictionalized version of ourselves and our shared life. The character of "Lily" has never left Pittsburgh - her hometown - and the character of "Ahmed" has never been to Egypt – his ancestral homeland. But the real Lily is not from Pittsburgh, and she in fact met Ahmed in Cairo (because that is where he was born and raised). So if the information provided in the film is not accurate to our true selves, why do this? Why not just give the characters fresh names and disassociate them from ourselves? Because it is not about the literal truth of our realities, but a greater and more honest truth that lies below the surface of the film. To be a directing duo and romantic partners is in many ways easy; we hold the same values and interests, and in turn share the same emotional, intellectual, and spiritual conflicts. However, difficulties arise from our relationship when creating characters that can accurately reflect ourselves. How can two people who were raised in vastly different cultural contexts have the same level of authorship of one project that purports to be deeply personal and emotionally open? Will the project not inevitably be more personal to one writer than the other? Won't one of us necessarily be excluded? Whose film is it, really? The question of authorship is one that is often asked of us and "Tales" is, in many ways, an attempt to answer that very question. It is a reflection of our true dynamic: individuals that are messily and inseparably intertwined.

### LILY EKIMIAN & A.T. RAGHEB | Writers, Directors, Editors, Producers





Lily Ekimian & Ahmed T. Ragheb are independent filmmakers based in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. Ekimian – part American, part Russian – is originally from Washington, D.C., and Ragheb – Egyptian, Dutch, and American – is originally from Cairo, Egypt; they met while both attending school in Cairo. Together they co-founded and run *The Pittsburgher*, an online arts and culture magazine, and a film production platform, Dog Door Films. Ekimian & Ragheb have recently completed their feature debut, *Portrait*, an experimental documentary. They have produced and directed music videos for Daniel Knox and The Handsome Family, as well as a series of short films. Their work deals heavily with the concepts of identity and place, with a special emphasis on feminism, cultural dislocation, and domestic relationships.

## BABAK DANESHVAR | Music


